The Lima-Allen County Regional Planning Commission (LACRPC) was established in September 1964 and assumed the powers and duties of the Allen County Planning Commission, which was created in 1954. LACRPC is also the federally designated metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for Allen County, including the portions of the City of Delphos and the Villages of Bluffton and Cridersville that lie outside of Allen County. The agency is responsible for comprehensive planning and program implementation within Allen County and its various communities and serves in an advisory capacity to community decision-makers who have come to rely on data, analyses, and planning recommendations provided by the Commission. A 34-member Board of Directors assists the Commission by reviewing and recommending plans and strategies to develop and improve the entire region. In addition, the agency works closely with other professionals such as city and county engineers, sanitary engineers, prosecutors, and auditors. Other agencies like Allen County Public Health, Allen Soil and Water Conservation District, Ohio Department of Transportation, Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Ohio Department of Public Safety, Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, and multiple local utilities provide valuable input to this process.



The Allen County Regional Transit Authority (ACRTA) was created in 1974 by the Board of Allen County Commissioners to provide needed transportation services across Allen County. Transit management reflects a seven-member Board of Trustees, appointed by the Allen County Commissioners, who oversee the operations of fixed-route and complementary paratransit services. In addition, ACRTA works with ODOT and LACRPC to optimize federal and state funding for necessary rolling stock, equipment, maintenance, facility upgrades, and technical assistance.

HOP A TROLLEY WITH THE RTA!



To support the growth happening throughout Downtown, RTA has purchased two trolleys to be used in Downtown loops to help transport visitors and patrons.

One trolley will operate on a fixed route in Downtown Lima circulating every half hour starting on Saturdays and Downtown Event days.

The second trolley will be used for parking lot pick up during events at the amphitheater, Veteran's Memorial Civic Center, and other such events.

This service will be free to the Downtown and its patrons through its first season.

SAFE COMMUNITIES

Since 1994, LACRPC has managed traffic safety-related projects using federal funds through grants administered by the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODPS). The 2022 Safe Communities Grants models a National Highway Traffic Safety Administration plan that targets interventions to reduce the occurrence of traffic crashes and the associated economic, societal, and personal costs. A few 2022 initiatives include:

- Countywide observational seatbelt surveys documented 80.1% restraint use.
- Promotionals resulted in an estimated 14 million traffic safety media impressions, both traditional and digital media, encouraging seatbelt use, motorcycle safety, risk awareness associated with impaired driving and distracted driving as well as bicycle/pedestrian safety, railroad grade crossing, etc.
- Participated in National Night Out with partners at the Allen County Sheriff's Office. Awareness materials, promoting traffic safety, were distributed, including "I'm bucklin' it" McDonald's dessert coupons.
- Promoted children's bicycle safety with partners Activate Allen County, St. Rita's Medical Center, and Lima Memorial Health System by distributing bicycle helmets to area youth.

Every year, the Safe Community Coalition takes nominations from our partners and the community to honor individuals who put in the work daily to make Lima-Allen County a safer place. ACTIVATE ALLEN COUNTY

Our local built environment is largely determined by land use and transportation decisions, and these decisions affect the quality of life of the community over the long term. Activate Allen County looks to use civic engagement and regulatory controls to address issues with the help of a broad-based coalition of local health care providers, major employers, development professionals and community leaders whose goal is to create a community in which all residents can thrive in our built environment. Concerns and discussions over transportation costs as well as the expenditures required for roadway maintenance and safety projects are finding allies with local residents who are concerned with active transportation, urban sprawl, farmland, preservation, and water/air quality standards. In a spirit of cooperation, this committee is working to explore the nature of these issues from a more holistic perspective. In a unique partnership, the RPC has entered into conversations, programming, and activities to examine sustainability and sustainable development on a number of different levels focusing on developing a balanced and equitable approach to transportation, land use, employment and an improved quality of life.

COMMUNITY BLOCK GRANT (CDBG)

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program is a flexible program that provides communities with resources to address a wide range of unique community development needs. The CDBG grants support affordable housing, necessary infrastructure improvements, and the delivery of antipoverty programs in eligible communities.

The Allen County Board of Commissioners is responsible for developing and delivering eligible local projects consistent with the program's national objectives. However, projects must benefit low-to-moderate income persons, aid a targeted population (such as senior citizens or the disabled), or provide for the elimination of slum/blight conditions.

In 2022, Allen County worked to deliver Community Housing Improvement Program Preservation (CHIPP) services to provide rehabilitation, first-time homebuyer assistance, emergency home repair, etc., to qualified residents of Allen County. In addition, the County CDBG Program, administered by RPC, funded WOCAP and GLCAP housing foreclosure counseling and fair housing education.

INFORMATION SERVICES

The LACRPC strives to provide information and data analysis to local decision-makers to enhance an intelligent decision-making process. The Commission concentrates on data collection and analysis activities in community development, transportation, environmental planning, and other areas of local interest. Most of the information gathered by LACRPC is available on our website at www.lacrpc.com. We also provide information via our technical library, our designation as a local Census affiliate, and many relationships we have built throughout Allen County due to many opportunities to provide technical support. The agency website proved to be a valuable tool for local information as it recorded 4.5K hits and recorded 6.3K user sessions in 2022.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

LACRPC has a unique and vital leadership role in Allen County. Founded upon regional collaboration, cooperation, and consensus-building principles, LACRPC serves as the common ground where area partners come together to work toward a shared vision across the region. Together, public and private partners develop and implement innovative and sustainable strategies that enhance the region's quality of life and economic vitality.

LACRPC recognizes that a public participation plan (PPP) provides methods, strategies, and desired outcomes for public involvement and is committed to meaningful and proactive public participation. This plan includes outreach to a broadly defined audience of affected parties to ensure projects and planning activities evolve from and address public needs. Providing a forum for public participation demonstrates that the region recognizes citizens' rights to be heard. DEVELOPMENTAL CONTROLS

LACRPC, in conjunction with a host of local agencies, assists its members in monitoring, reviewing, and approving development activities within Allen County while helping establish regulatory controls to minimize adverse environmental and economic effects as a result of development. The agency administers the minor and major subdivision process and floodplain regulations in the unincorporated areas of Allen County. In addition, the agency is responsible for the review of a host of zoning issues every year.


FINANCIAL REPORT

The LACRPC expended a budget of \$637,361 in CY 2022. Local membership assessments of \$122,465 were used in the operating budget to leverage state and federal planning grants by approximately 4.63 to 1. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Federal Transit Administration (FTA), and the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Transportation funded the agency's transportation planning activities. At the same time, the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODPS) supported various safety initiatives.

The LACRPC Board of Directors is responsible for making sure that sound decisions are made concerning spending and stimulating the flow of state and federal funds in Allen County. Member governments invested \$122,645 in per capita fees to the LACRPC. The community received grants, services, and capital improvements of more than \$31.4 million. A simple assessment reveals "a return of approximately \$276.76 as compared to CY 2021 at \$186.96 to the larger community for every \$1 entrusted to LACRPC in CY 2021." In addition, LACRPC delivered noncash benefits to its members by providing a vehicle to exchange valuable information.
